
PACK TRIPS: Minimum - 4 people. Add \$40.00 per day, per person, to regular rates. Pack trips have become so popular, we need advance notice of dates if you wish to plan a pack trip. Reservations for pack trips will be made on a "first come" basis.

FALL HORSE DRIVE: Approximately the last week of September, we take a limited number of guests along on our fall horse drive to winter pasture. The rate is \$700.00 per person for seven days. Please write for details.

DEPOSIT: A deposit of **25% of total stay** is required to **comfirm** all reservations. **Cancellation:** Deposit will be applied to any space cancelled less than six week before reservation starts, unless that space can be filled.

The above rates do no include Wyoming Sales Tax of 1.6%. A 10% service charge will be added to cover all gratuities.

Sunday: At dinner we have a cook-out at our barbecue grounds by the pond. The children will be supervised from 6 P.M. on at the barbeque grounds. The Galey's invite all of the Adults to cocktails in their front yard at 6 P.M. Dinner is served to the children at 6:30 P.M. and the Adults at 7:00 P.M. Then we have marshmallows and singing.

Picnic Lunches: Sign up in the dining room for picnic lunches for riding, hiking, driving, etc.

If you're off to Yellowstone for the day we'll be glad to supply enough picnic for lunch and dinner.

WHERE THINGS ARE

- **Dining Rooms:** The Adult dining room is the central room of the Main Cabin with the french doors.
 - The Children's dining room adjoins it on the north. It's door opens on the west and mail box is located just inside that door.
- Adult Lounge: The south wing of the Main Cabin is a bottle bar with a locker for each cabin, and a lounge deck. No one under 19 is permitted in this area by Wyoming Law. Cards, card table, poker table, books and various games are provided. Hor d'oerves are served each evening at 6.
- Loft: Here's where the kids come in! At the north end of the barn (closest to the Main Cabin) a stairway leads up to the loft. There you will find a ping pong table, pool table, backgammon boards, chess sets, checkers, card games, coloring books, or children's books, bean bag games, a pop machine, a juke box, and bathroom facilities. Windows and a balcony provide a safe overlook for the activity in the corrals below.
- Office: The office entrance opens from the parking area at the Galey House. Office hours are 8 A.M. 12 Noon, 1 P.M. 5 P.M. If there is an emergency outside of those hours please do not hesitate to come to the Galey House for assistance at any hour. If you have any problem in any area, please notify the office or Frank Galey. At the office we have lots of information on outside activities in the area in addition to the material in the stationery folder in your cabin. We will be glad to make any arrangements or reservations for you.
- **Telephone:** A pay telephone is located in the shop opposite the barn, In-coming messages will be delivered to your mail box in the children's dining room, or to your cabin if urgent.
- Mail: Outgoing mail is picked up from the mailbox in the children's dining room at noon, and incoming mail is distributed there daily.
- Laundry: Laundry and cleaning are taken to town on Tuesday and Friday, and returned Friday and Tuesday. Please bundle your laundry with a list and leave by mail boxes at breakfast. There is a laundromat at Moose Enterprises.

SUGGESTIONS AND COMPLAINTS

If your cabin runs out of hot water or has plumbing problems, please tell the first member of the staff you see so that the problem can be corrected immediately.

Any other problems should be discussed with Mr. Galey who will give them his full and immediate attention.

We are always looking for ways to make your stay more enjoyable, and will welcome any suggestions you may have.

RIDING

- What to wear: Be Comfortable, but: your shoes or boots must have a heel to keep your foot from slipping through the stirrup; you should protect your skin from our high altitude sun, and scratches in the timber; always take some form of rain gear.
- **Starting Out:** Go to the barn and ask for the Head Wrangler he will be expecting you. Tell him about your riding experience and he will assign you a suitable horse. If you like it, it will be yours for your stay with us. Don't hesitate to ask for instruction or advice.
- Riding: Whenever you wish to ride and/or take a picnic lunch, sign up on the board in the dining room the night before or at breakfast your horse will be ready for you. You may ride anytime you wish between 9 and 5 except Sunday afternoon. If you wish to ride outside those hours, please consult our Head Wrangler so your horse can be given extra feed. We have enough wranglers so you may ride when, where and with whom you choose.
- **Kid's Rides:** Our Kid Wranglers supervise the children's rides with particular emphasis on safety, instruction and fun. Picnics, gymkana practice and lots of other special riding activities. Extra care and attention are given to very young or insecure children.
- **Lessons:** Our Head Wrangler will be pleased to arrange for riding lessons for you or your family.

SAFETY TIPS

You and your children will be safe and happy on the ranch if you will observe the following suggestions:

- **Ponds and Lakes:** The water is cold and cramps are possible. Please do not swim alone or let children swim without adult supervision.
- Off Limits: The barn, kitchen and linen room are all strictly off limits. You could be hurt or cause an accident.
- Ranch Pets: All of the animals on the ranch are gentle and friendly (but watch out for the chickens and geese). Accidents happen only if they are frightened or teased. A slow gentle approach goes a long way to preventing problems.
- Cars: The parking area is located outside the fence separating the Main Cabin area from the driveway. Cars are permitted within the cabin area ONLY for loading and unloading upon arrival and departure.
- **Speed Limit:** Please drive as if your youngest child or favorite pet could pop out onto the road in front of you any second. We want your vacation to end happily.

For Safety, Courtesy, and how to look Experienced the first Time Out, here's STRUTHERS BURT'S advice from DIARY OF A DUDE-WRANGLER, 1925.

Do Not ride off while someone else is in a vulnerable position, like Mounting or Dismounting, Opening or Shutting a gate.

Let your horse drink whenever he wants to. But **Do Not Let Him Eat On The Trail.** Nothing spoils a horse quicker then this.

Check your cinch every time you mount your horse.

Tuck your bottom under, and sit back, especially you ladies. Men do that automatically.

A fast walk is not a natural gait. Use your heels.


Only in Western Novels do people gallop endlessly over the Prairies....

Use a slow trot and fast walk - save your loping for the cool parts of the day. Bringing a horse back wet is a sure sign of a poor rider.

Be riding all the time. If you're absent-minded while riding someday your horse will make a fool out of you, or you will make a fool out of him.

Never allow your horse to run to the barn unless you have a hankering to hang yourself on the chinning bar just inside the door.

And Unless you have a seriously considered desire for hoofprints embossed upon your person, do not walk up behind a horse. Even the gentlest can kick if startled.
